


St. Francis of Assisi

and animals.**




St. Thérèse of Lisieux

small, quiet ways.**




St. Joan of Arc

faith.**




St. Peter

pope.**




St. Teresa of Calcutta

with great love.




St. John Paul II

Christ.





St. Joseph

faith.





Took the place of

Forgave her attacker before she died and is remembered for her purity and courage.




St. Ignatius of Loyola

Saint Memory Match Game – Facilitator Instructions

Preparation:

1. Print the card templates. Use cardstock or sturdy paper.
2. Cut into individual cards.
3. Mix all the cards and keep them face down before the game starts.
4. Clear a table or floor space large enough to lay out all cards in rows.

How to Play:

1. Arrange all cards face down in a grid pattern.
2. Divide the youth into small teams or take turns one by one.
3. On each turn, a player flips over two cards, trying to find a matching pair (saint + correct fact).
4. If the player makes a correct match, remove the pair and read the saint's name and fact out loud to the group.
5. If the cards don't match, turn them back over and move to the next player or team.
6. Continue until all matches are found.
7. After the game, ask a few quick questions:
 - Which saints stood out to you?
 - Which ones have you heard of before?
 - Did anything surprise you?

Purpose:

This game helps youth learn about saints who have died in Christ and are remembered by the Church. It connects them to the Communion of Saints.
